
CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

WEBER BASIN WATER CONSERVATION

Weber Basin Water Conservancy District <u>will begin charging</u> <u>the water irrigation lines as of April 15th</u>. It is best to have your valves turned OFF while the charging begins in case the beginning pressure is too much for the lines to handle. Remember that you can train turf to be drought tolerant by waiting

as long as possible to begin watering and waiting as long as possible between watering cycles. All of the classes and events are free and everyone is welcome to attend! Classes and registration can be found at www.weberbasin.com/conservation.

TRASH CAN NUMBER

Due to the high winds in the city, trash cans could be blown away and get mixed up with others. Each home has at least one regular trash can. The City and Robinson Waste Management do not keep track of which can goes to which home. So we are asking our residents to please record the number on their cans so they can identify them if they get lost.

<u>REMINDER:</u> Parking any vehicle, recreational vehicle, or equipment for longer than 24 hours on the street in any seven day period is an infraction and subject to penalty.

in your emergency kits. Fruit Heights will conduct a community exercise similar to years past. Please display a "Green" placard in your street-facing window on the morning of April 21st. Neighborhood Coordinators will count the placards, report numbers observed to the Area Coordinator who will transmit by radio the information to the city's Emergency Operations Center. Please plan to participate! This is an excellent way to prepare for a real emergency or disaster in our City of Good Neighbors.

NOW OPEN! Pioneer Adult Rehabilitation Center (PARC) has opened a thrift store collocated with the Davis Landfill Recycling Cen-

ter. PARC is a Community Rehabilitation Program providing opportunities for people with disabilities who cannot obtain training and
