CITIZEN'S ACADEMY

Next Citizen's Academy: Tuesday February 21, 2017 6:00-7:00 pm at City Building

It will also be an opportunity where Council members can help educate and inform the community about upcoming projects, city budget, and other outreach programs and opportunities.

Anyone is invited to attend. Meetings will be informal with an open discussion and dialogue. All items discussed will be taken under advisement, and if necessary, will be discussed in an upcoming Council meeting.

<u>REMINDER:</u> November 1st through April 1st, overnight parking is prohibited on streets from 12:00 a.m.—8:00 a.m. <u>and during times of snowfall.</u>

Please tell guests/renters. Also remove trash cans from street promptly for our snowplows to do their best to keep roads clear.

APARTMENTS

Apartments or ADU's-Assessory Dwelling Unit owners are required to adhere to the city's ordinance 10-11-21(2010-01, 6-1-2010). An approval permit by the city is to be issued to an apartment owner. A maximum of one ADU shall be allowed within or attached to each owner occupied single-family dwelling.

Apartments are to: **a)** house elderly parents, disabled relatives, and other **family members** under conditions where those family members can enjoy a degree of independence while also having assistance readily available when needed; **b)** to accommodate such housing in single-family residential neighborhoods with minimal impacts on the neighborhood in terms of traffic, noise, parking, congestion, and compatible scale and appearance of residential buildings; **c)** to prevent the proliferation of rental dwellings, absentee ownership, property disinvestment, building code violations, and associated decline in quality of single-family residential neighborhoods.

SPRING CLEAN-UP

Spring clean-up will be from Mon. through Sat. April 10th—22nd. Vouchers will be available beginning Mon.

April 3rd at the city offices for residents to help cover cost of disposal of green lawn waste at the Wasatch Integrated Landfill, 1997 E. 3500 N. Layton 84041.





Please be aware of your speed on our streets. Our police officers have said that WE are our own worst offenders in our neighborhoods. As citizens of

Fruit Heights, we must be in control of the speed of our cars in our city. People crossing streets, along with joggers, bikers, and walkers come first, even if they are on the street. Sidewalks are to be used when possible, but pedestrians have the right-of-way.

PLEASE DON'T SNOW-BLOW/ THROW SNOW INTO STREET

It is against City Ordinance to snow-blow/shovel snow into the street or any other public right-of-way. This is classified as a Class B misdemeanor citation. Sidewalks must be cleared of all snow, sleet or ice within a 24-

hour period. Pile the snow onto the sides of driveways or parking strips-not into the street. Plowing will be avoided in those areas of the city streets where ob-



structions exist which have the potential of damaging snow removal equipment.
