UDOT MEETING SCHEDULED FOR HWY. 89

Residents, you are invited to attend a public meeting on Thursday, March 30, from 6:00-7:30 pm at the Farmington Community Center (120 Main St.) where representatives from UDOT will be in attendance to discuss the reconstruction of Highway 89, and in particular the Nicholls Crossing and Lloyd Rd. extension portion of the overall project. Since the public hearing at Burton Elementary in January, UDOT has been reviewing more than 250 public comments and they intend to discuss their findings and recommendations at this meeting. UDOT has reserved this venue to be able to accommodate more people than our City Building can hold.

Changes are headed our way in Fruit Heights, as our city is bisected by US-89, which will see reconstruction beginning in the Spring of 2019. The population of Davis County is expected to double by the year 2040, and traffic, safety and air quality are of paramount concern to everyone living near Highway 89. This UDOT project has been in the planning stages for many years and is now coming to fruition. UDOT has initiated a State Environmental Study (SES) to improve traffic flow and safety on US-89 from Farmington north to I-84. Growing traffic demand has caused the US-89 corridor between Farmington and I-84 to become increasingly congested during the morning and evening peak travel periods. Traffic studies project an increase in traffic volume with congestion worsening in the future. The SES will develop and evaluate freeway improvement options to accommodate the growing traffic demand after inviting public input. Proposed changes include concepts such as constructing an additional lane in each direction and consolidating ac-

cess points in the study area. Several components of UDOT's project will affect Fruit Heights City. The 200 North (400 North) intersection will become an interchange and the Nicholls Rd/89 intersection will become a grade separated crossing. These changes will improve street connectivity, which will provide multiple options for access, reduce traffic impact on major streets, reduce idling of vehicles, and increase response time for emergency vehicles. In addition, traffic improvements will be made at the Lloyd Rd/ Main St. intersection, and a connector/feeder road will be constructed connecting Lloyd Rd. to Nicholls Rd. to improve west side access. Much study and work has been put forth by present and past City Councils, Citizen advisory committee recommendations, as well as UDOT working with both citizens and City Councils to improve safety coupled with access. The current UDOT design as well as our Fruit Heights City Plan is based on the desires of the community to keep Nicholls Road open to east west traffic and provide access and emergency response to the east side of the city. It will affect residents in different ways. Some will have increased traffic, some will have restricted views, some will have a longer commute time, and others more noise from the highway. We are sensitive to these changes. As your elected representatives, we will do all that we can in our positions to mitigate any negative impact to neighborhoods and be vigilant as these projects move forward to insure our community retains its safety, value, and desirability as a place to live. We are constrained in what control we can have on a UDOT project but we will do what we can to make sure that the aesthetics, safety, and quality are built into the projects. We as a Council would like to thank those courteous residents who have been supportive even though they may have major changes in their lives. - Julia Busche', City Council

This year, current grant funding covers the cost of participants on Medicare or Medicaid. All others pay \$200 and receive \$100 back upon program completion.
