SEWER SYSTEM

The Spring of 2017 has been unusually wet, resulting in challenges to homeowners and Central Davis Sewer District. When homeowners illegally drain excess rain water into the sewer system it can cause problems with neighbors by over-loading the sewer collection lines with the potential of sewer water backing up into homes. The sewer treatment plant spends additional time and money to treat the excess rain water that it was never designed to treat. If you have a pump that is discharging into the sewer please redirect it to a legal means of drainage. If you are unsure of how to accomplish this please contact the city.

Ways to prevent water getting into your house:

- Make sure your lot is graded so the water does not drain back toward the house.
- Do not leave sprinklers on too long, or too often.
- Install extensions on the rain gutters to carry water away from the house.

DAYLIGHT SAVINGS TIME



Daylight Savings Time ends Sunday, November 5th. Remember to "fall back" by setting your clocks back one hour.

REMINDER: November 1st through April 1st, overnight parking is prohibited on streets from 12:00 a.m.—8:00 a.m. and during times of snowfall. Please tell guests/ renters. Also remove trash cans from street promptly for our snowplows to do their best to keep roads clear.

TREE TRIMMING TIME

Remember to trim your trees! All property owners and/or occupants shall trim all trees within the parkways abutting their property, or between the street and the front of their property to a height of ten feet (10') above the curb, on the curb side, or twelve (12') above the street, to allow large trucks and/or equipment to pass freely.
