A BIG THANK YOU TO ALL OF THE PROFESSIONALS AND VOLUNTEERS INVOLVED IN HELPING WITH THE RECENT WILDFIRE IN OUR AREA. YOUR EXPERTISE AND PROFESSIONALISM IS APPRECIATED BY ALL.

As a result of the wildfire, properties located below or downstream of the burn areas are at an increased risk for flooding. Excessive amounts of rainfall can happen throughout the year. Rivers of liquid and flowing mud are caused by a combination of brush loss and subsequent heavy rains. Rapid snowmelt can also trigger mudflows. The City will provide sand and sandbags for residents most likely to experience flooding due to the fire. You can fill bags at our stock yard on Nicholls Road in the fenced area just west of the park. Plan on bringing your own shovel and hauling the sandbags.



Approximately 2 years ago Fruit Heights City, in cooperation with the Department of Natural Resources, Division of Forestry, Fires, and State Lands, implemented a Wildfire Protection Plan. The purpose for this plan is to identify areas within our City that have a heightened risk of wildfires that could result in the loss of property and/or life. With the recent Francis Fire, it was noted that several homes within the evacuation zones are at an increased risk of property loss and/or damage due to the vegetation that is around the homes. The City is asking that all citizens spend some time evaluating your properties and the landscaping around your homes to see if you're at risk. Are there some preventative measures that can be taken now to protect your home from a wildfire and how can you better protect your home if a fire were to start in your neighborhood? Providing a defensible space around your home will give fire fighters the ability to better protect your property in the event of a fire.

If you are interested in organizing a community project where trees and vegetation can be cleared, cut out, or removed within a neighborhood, Fruit Heights City is willing to help. PAPERLESS BILLS

Beginning 2020 Fruit Heights City will be assessing a processing fee for paper Utility Bills. To avoid this fee you can sign up for paperless bills on your Xpress Bill Pay account or you can call City Hall for assistance.

TREE TRIMMING TIME

Remember to trim your trees! All property owners and/or occupants shall trim all trees within the parkways abutting their property, or between the street and the front of their property to a height of ten feet (10') above the curb, on the curb side, or twelve (12') above the street, to allow large trucks and/or equipment to pass freely.
