

CONSTRUCTION ON US-89 BRINGING ROAD AND TRAFFIC CHANGES

UDOT's project on US-89 has brought many changes, and the next few weeks are no exception. The following information is meant to help residents navigate our streets. Please note, UDOT's plans may change, and the City will provide updates as information becomes available.



650 North: Traffic on 650 N. will access US-89 at 400 N. and not at Crestwood Rd. Crews are working between Oakmont Lane and 650 N. This requires closure through February.

Oakmont Lane: Traffic on Oakmont Lane will continue to detour to Crestwood Rd.


Mountain Road: Work begins soon on the north end of Mountain Rd. at approximately Terrace Dr., and extend to 650 N. Crews will work to relocate underground utilities. Expect delays and detours.

Nicholls Road: Utility work will occur at US-89 and Nicholls Rd. in preparation for lowering US-89 later this year. Expect delays and detours.

1350 East: Utilities will be marked in the street and yards in preparation for underground utility work. Utilities will be rerouted down 1350 E. They will cross under US-89 and tie into Lloyd Rd. Completion will take several weeks.

Green Road: Utility work will begin at US-89 and Green Rd. A waterline is being installed on the west side of US-89, as well as the relocation of underground utilities on the east side of US-89 between Green Rd. and Peach Tree Lane. Expect closures and delays.

Lloyd Road: Dominion Energy is installing a new natural gas line. Construction work at Main St. will extend north along Lloyd Rd. to Nicholls Rd. Work will be along the shoulder, but travel could be delayed.

IMPORTANT TIPS FOLLOWING WINDSTORM

Garbage cans were recently redistributed throughout the city thanks to another windstorm. Many residents lost their garbage cans, while other residents gained quite a collection.

Cans are the responsibility of residents, and if a can is lost or destroyed, Robinson Waste charges an \$85 replacement fee to the resident. Please record the number printed on your garbage or green waste can, and after a storm, please help neighbors find missing cans to avoid unnecessary charges.

Green waste service resumes April 1, 2021. Until then, green cans may be used as an additional garbage can.

NOTES FROM ROBINSON WASTE:

- Place can curbside by 6 a.m. on collection day.
- Do not place container near parked vehicles, and do not block delivery of mail.
- Place containers four feet apart.
- Remove your container off street by the end of day.

CONTACT COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT FOR COVID-19 VACCINE

The Davis County Health Department is administering COVID-19 vaccinations for Davis County residents, including those living in Fruit Heights City.

Due to high demand and limited availability, appointments have been very difficult to schedule. Vaccines are currently available for healthcare workers, long-term care facility staff and residents, first responders, K-12 teachers and staff, and Utahns 70 years or older. However, appointments are set to match the supply of vaccine doses received. It may take several weeks to get an appointment.

The timeline for vaccine distribution is determined by the Unified Command at the state level. Timelines may change, and are dependent on how much vaccine the health department receives.

The health department is anticipating COVID-19 vaccines in the near future for other age groups, people with certain medical conditions, and those who live in congregate settings and are at a higher risk for the virus.



MAYOR, TWO COUNCIL SEATS UP FOR ELECTION THIS YEAR

Election season just ended, and many of us are happy to have elections in the rearview for a few months. However, municipal elections are held on odd number years, and 2021 brings several decisions to Fruit Heights residents. This year, the office of Mayor and two city council seats are up for election.

Fruit Heights City operates under a unique election system which allows residents to meet together in a Caucus Meeting and nominate those who will represent their party and run in the November Municipal General Election.

On or before May 31, the City will organize and hold its two-party Caucus meetings for the Pinecone and Sagebrush Parties. During this meeting, each party will nominate one mayoral candidate and two city council candidates.

Individuals nominated through the Caucus meetings become the candidates running for office, and are required to file a declaration of candidacy with the Fruit Heights City Recorder between June 1 and June 7, and pay a \$25.00 filing fee.

More information about meetings, dates, times, and locations will be announced on the City's website and social media accounts.
