GENERAL ELECTION 2021

ELECTION DAY IS TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 2



The Davis County Clerk's Office oversees elections, not Fruit Heights City, but we want to help provide information about voting this year. You may visit https://vote.utah.gov/ or https://www.daviscountyutah.gov/clerk-auditor/elections for more information.

You may also call the Davis County Clerk's Office at 801-451-3508.

This year, Fruit Heights residents will vote for the office of Mayor and two City Council seats. Learn about each candidate by visiting www.fruitheightscity.com.

HOW DO I REGISTER TO VOTE?

To register online, visit vote.utah.gov and click on "Register to Vote". You may also register in person at the Davis County Clerk's Office at 61 S. Main Street in Farmington. In order to vote, you must be registered by 5 p.m. on Friday, October 22.

HOW DO I VOTE THIS YEAR?

You may vote by mail, or by using a

secure ballot drop box, or in person. Ballots will be mailed to all eligible voters starting three weeks before the election.

TO VOTE BY MAIL

(Do one of the following)
1. Postmark your ballot on or before Monday, November 1. Return postage is provided.

OR

2. Drop your ballot at a secure drop box by 8 p.m. on Election Day. Drop boxes are located throughout the County, including one in the parking lot of Fruit Heights City Hall at 910 S. Mountain Road. Davis County residents may use any Davis County drop box.

TO VOTE IN PERSON

An Election Day Voting Center will be located at Fruit Heights City Hall, 910 S. Mountain Road, open from 7 a.m. - 8 p.m. on election day, Tuesday, November 2. State law requires voters present valid identification to vote at the poll. Learn more at https://www.daviscountyutah.gov/clerk-auditor/elections.

CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

Street/Sidewalk Assessment: Streets and sidewalks of Fruit Heights will be inspected and assessed over the next few weeks. Residents may see workers and vehicles driving slowly through areas as the study is completed.

Crack Sealing: Beginning this fall, crews will be working on several city streets, filling cracks that develop in the asphalt. This process helps extend the life of roads, and prevents water, snow, and ice from getting under the asphalt and causing further damage to the road surface.

New Pavement: Beginning next week, UDOT will begin replacing the pavement on 650 North and Mountain Road. Beginning in two weeks, UDOT will begin paving 1350 East.

400 North: The interchange at 200 N./400 N. is now open. Finish work will continue through 2021, but traffic flow will be maintained. U.S. 89 will remain narrowed while the bridge at Nicholls Road is constructed.

Nicholls Road: Now that the 200 N./400 N. interchange is open, UDOT closed Nicholls Rd. at U.S. 89 for approximately 24 months while crews work to install a bridge over U.S. 89. Traffic on U.S. 89 will shift as crews work on the Nicholls Rd. portion of the project.

Mill & Overlay Work: Mill and overlay work is complete. Crews will now raise sewer manhole covers and water valves to the new level. Residents should continue to watch for workers and cones in the area.

INFORMATION TO NOTE

WINTER PARKING: Winter parking runs November 1 - April 1. No parking on streets overnight, or during snowfall.

GREEN WASTE CAN: Green waste service ends December 1. Green cans may then be used as a garbage can through March.

PARK RESTROOMS: Public restrooms will lock for the season starting the end of October or early November.

DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME: Turn clocks back 1 hour Sunday, Nov. 7, 2021.
