YOUR TREES RECENTLY?

In recent weeks, letters have gone out to nearly 200 homes in Fruit Heights regarding trees and shrubs hanging over roads and sidewalks.

As our beautiful trees mature, trimming becomes necessary. Street sweepers and snow plows have not been able to effectively clean many streets due to low-hanging branches.

Code requires trees and vegetation to be trimmed to 12' above the street and 8' above the sidewalk.

FIREWORK SAFETY

Many of us enjoy fun summer celebrations. Fireworks

seem to make the party even better. However, we must all be aware of safety issues and wildfire hazards.

Surrounded by so much vegetation and fuel for fire, there is a strong need for restriction regarding open fires and fireworks in our city. Much of our city falls in a restricted area, allowing no discharging of fireworks.

ARE THERE WATER RESTRICTIONS THIS SUMMER?

Last year brought tight restrictions on secondary water use. This year, many residents have asked what restrictions might be in place again. Secondary water providers in our area are not imposing the same restrictions, but they are asking all homeowners to follow a few guidelines:

- No watering between 10 am and 6 pm
- Only water 2 3 times a week
- 20 minutes for pop up sprayers
- 40 minutes for rotating sprinklers
- Delay watering if rain is in the forecast

Please contact your secondary water provider with specific questions.

WATER CONSERVATION PRACTICES

- Weber Basin is offering two incentive programs: Flip Your Strip and Landscape Lawn Exchange. Those wishing to participate will work with Weber Basin and Utah Water Savers. Visit: https://weberbasin.com/conservation/rebates.
- Residents of Fruit Heights may purchase a Smart Sprinkler Controller from the City for \$20 (retail \$178).
- In 2022, Utah passed legislation requiring water districts to install secondary meters by 2030. At this point, information from meters is being used for educational purposes. Fruit Heights has installed meters to those homes receiving secondary water from the City. Contact your secondary water provider to learn more about meters in your area.

HAPPENING AROUND THE CITY

Mountain Road: We are still talking about Mountain Road and the Weber Basin project, but an end is in sight. During the final stages of milling, which occurs right before the asphalt installation, the milling truck experienced mechanical failures. This caused a delay as a new machine was brought in. Final repairs are expected to be done by June 10.

U.S. 89 Projects: Can you believe it? UDOT is nearing completion on US 89. They have done an incredible job. UDOT crews are completing final tasks and working to complete sidewalks, pedestrian ramps, curb and gutter, driveways and other side-street items. If you have specific questions, contact UDOT at 888-752-8789. UDOT is planning a celebration on Friday, June 30, at 10 am for a walk/run/ride along new frontage roads, bridges and parking areas built to provide safer connections between neighborhoods as part of the project. The event starts at the Antelope Park & Ride and concludes at the Adams Canyon trailhead parking lot. Refreshments will be provided. Bring your family and friends!

Shady Lane/ Waterfall Way: The new waterline is installed. Utility and road work will be completed by mid-July.
