1800 EAST EXTENDING SOUTH: CONNECTING TO FARMINGTON



On April 1, crews began work at the south end of 1800 East, working south, to extend a new water line and road. The water line will tie into an existing water line at View Court, increasing water pressure to homes in the area. The new road will connect to Bella Vista, a road in Farmington. The project is scheduled to be completed in June.

WHAT DOES THIS MEAN TO RESIDENTS?

Residents in the immediate area have received information about the project. For the safety of everyone, Fruit Loops bike trails and other hiking trails are open, but only when crews are not working. Please follow closure times.

SPRING CLEAN-UP VOUCHERS

APRIL 5 - 22

Each spring, Fruit Heights City offers a **FREE** spring clean-up program to residents. This program provides vouchers to dump green waste at the Davis Landfill located at 1997 E. 3500 N. in Layton.

Vouchers are good April 5 - 22, and may be picked up at Fruit Heights City Hall starting Thurs, April 4.

Homeowners may request up to three vouchers per home. Vouchers cover vehicles with total load weight at or below 10,000 lbs.

YOU CAN PROTECT OUR DRAIN SYSTEM

Water from snow or rain that does not soak into the ground is known as stormwater. It flows over yards and into roads toward storm drains.

As stormwater flows, it collects pollutants such as litter, pesticides, fertilizers, and oil. To protect our drain system and the water, please remember:

- Clear leaves or debris from storm drain grates
- Keep mulch, rock, dirt, fertilizers off roads, walks/driveways
- Do not blow grass into road
- Do not use water to wash walks/driveways

Our storm system can handle large amounts of water, but by taking easy steps, we can all help prevent flooding or contamination issues.



ADOPT A GRATE! Nope, we're not even kidding. Crews work to clean our streets, but you can help. Choose a grate near you, and help clear leaves and debris. Fruit Heights City will provide gloves and bags. Call Ted Parry at 801-927-7039 or email tparry@fruitheightscity.com.

CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

Nicholls Park: Years of construction on US-89 caused the ballparks at Nicholls Park to go without water. City crews are excited to get the ballparks back in shape. New sprinkler lines are going in now, which will be followed by improvements to the hillside and then all new landscaping will go in.

Mill & Overlay Work: This process removes the top 2 inches of old asphalt and replaces it with new asphault. Terrace Drive, Estate Way and Nicholls Road are set to receive this work in April and May.

Chip Seal Work: This process distributes a thin layer of hot tar and finely graded aggregate onto an existing paved surface. Several streets are set to recieve this work this spring, including Cherry Lane and Country Lane.

City Hall: Areas of the front porch and patio of the City Hall building have sunk, cracked and are detaching from the building. City Manager, Darren Frandsen, wrote for, and was awarded, a grant to remove the damaged areas and rebuild the front patio, steps and access ramp. Watch for updates.
