

READY TO RUN FOR OFFICE?

MAYOR AND TWO COUNCIL SEATS TO BE ELECTED IN 2025

WILL IT BE A **CAUCUS** OR **PRIMARY** ELECTION?

After months of conversations and a public survey regarding the election system in Fruit Heights, the city council will hold a public hearing on Tuesday, April 8, to decide future plans for elections in Fruit Heights.

WILL IT BE A CAUCUS?

Fruit Heights is one of two cities in Utah to nominate candidates for city office through a caucus meeting. In this system, a meeting is held on a single night, and those in attendance nominate and vote for who will be the final candidates for office.

OR PRIMARY ELECTION?

The alternative is a primary election system where individuals declare their own candidacy, followed by a city-wide primary election to decide the final candidates for office.

ATTEND THE PUBLIC HEARING

Residents are invited to share their thoughts at the public hearing, which will be held during a regularly scheduled city council meeting at 7 pm in the Council Chambers of Fruit Heights City Hall on Tuesday, April 8. Comments from the public are limited to 3-minutes per comment.

Following the public hearing, the council will vote on the election process issue.

STORM DRAIN: THE PURPOSE IS IN THE NAME

KNOW WHAT DOES AND WHAT DOESN'T BELONG

As the name implies, the City's storm drain is meant for water from snow or rain. Anything other than stormwater DOES NOT BELONG IN THE DRAIN.

Municipal storm systems are not designed to treat or handle other types of waste. Discharges like sewage, industrial waste, or pollutants can contaminate the storm drain system and ultimately pollute nearby lakes, rivers, and streams.

Any discharge to a storm drain system that is not composed entirely of precipitation runoff can contaminate water resources, and is known as an illicit discharge.



What is an Illicit Discharge?

An illicit discharge is anything entering a storm drainage system that is not composed entirely of storm water

- Sprinklers can wash pesticides, fertilizers and weed killers from our gardens and lawns
- Detergents, oils and grease from washing your car can also contribute to illicit discharge
- Some illicit discharges may be the result of illegal activities such as dumping materials into stormdrains or connecting waste water pipe into a storm drain

Protect our storm system: Only stormwater down the drain

HAPPENING AROUND THE CITY

CenturyLink: CenturyLink, who has been in the city for years, is an Internet service provider. They are currently upgrading their existing network and equipment, which will involve crews working in utility easements. Crews are to give residents advanced notice of work to be done, and yards are to be returned to original condition when work is completed. Work will run through April. Crack Sealing: This process involves cleaning out small cracks in the road with compressed air, then distributing a thin layer of hot tar and finely graded aggregate onto an existing paved surface. Several areas are set to receive this work in the spring.

Road Work: There are not any major road projects planned this year. Some areas will receive patches or repairs, and other areas will receive new striping.
